# The National Steinbeck Center Presents International Photo Exhibition *ARTISTS IN PARALLEL:*

Griffith J. Davis & John Steinbeck January 13 – March 24, 2024

## SALINAS, (CA), USA – January 9, 2024

The Griffith J. Davis Photographs and Archives in partnership with The National Steinbeck Center will present a new and unique international exhibition entitled, *Artists in Parallel: Griffith J. Davis & John Steinbeck*, on Saturday, January 13, 2024 starting with an Artist's Reception at 5:30 PM to 7:00 PM (PT). The featured speaker will be Griff Davis' daughter, Dorothy M. Davis, President of Griffith J. Davis Photographs and Archives. She will give remarks about the historical importance of the photography and legacy of her father Griffith J. Davis (1923-1993), internationally renowned pioneer Black photojournalist, filmmaker, and U.S. Senior Foreign Service Officer, and the impact it had on her family.

The National Steinbeck Center, One Main Street, Salinas, California has curated a four-fold exhibit of the enduring art these men leave behind. The exhibit shows Davis and Steinbeck's artistic depictions of **Celebrities**, **Political**

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**figures**, **Family life**, and **Development projects**. This exhibit is a deep dive into the importance of art in the unfolding of world events and explores how the people who document these momentous events leave as much of an enduring legacy as those who author them.

A pioneer international photographer, journalist, U.S. Senior Foreign Service Officer, and photodocumentarian, Mr. Davis' artistic and iconic photographs capture historical moments and figures, lifestyles, personalities, and people across a spectrum of political, socio-economic, and artistic sectors at the vortex of the Civil Rights Movement and the Independence Movement of Africa. His rarely seen 1948 to 1961 era images of his groundbreaking life and photographic practice will be fully placed.

When asked about his guiding life principles, Griff Davis wrote, "My upbringing taught me to be a thinker, to be innovative, to pursue excellence at all times and to always work for the betterment of mankind no matter in what environment I found myself."

Combining his skills as photojournalist and filmmaker into his 35-year career as a diplomat specializing in international development communications for ultimately the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) in Liberia, Tunisia, Nigeria, and across Africa, Mr. Davis was able to use his art forms to impact emerging and existing legislators and policymakers across continents while nurturing common ground between different cultures and mindsets. An Atlanta, Georgia native during the Jim Crow era when state and local







laws enforced racial segregation in the Southern United States, his internal lens informed his external eye in ways that enabled his perspective to influence the key influencers with whom he regularly rubbed elbows in that era. They included his professor, mentor, landlord, a lifelong friend, Writer and Poet Langston Hughes; friend and first African Nobel Laureate for Literature Wole Soyinka of Nigeria; Jazz Legends Duke Ellington and Bud Powell; Singer and Actress Lena Horne; Academy Award Winner and Civil Rights Activist Sidney Poitier; friend and Nobel Laureate Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.; Liberia's President William V.S. Tubman; Ethiopia's Imperial Majesty Haile Selassie; Ghana's Founding Prime Minister Kwame Nkrumah; Tunisia's Founding President Habib Bourguiba; U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower; then-U.S. Vice President Richard M. Nixon and a host of notable people from across the globe.

This exhibition premiered at the University of South Florida Contemporary Art Museum entitled as "Still Here: The Griffith J. Davis Photographs and Archives in Context" from January 22 to March 6, 2021 in Tampa, Florida. Griff Davis' photographs are permanently installed at the Museum of Broadway in Times Square, New York City; the U.S. Supreme Court Archives at the request of Supreme Court Justice Stephen Breyer; and the U.S Embassy/Monrovia at the request of then-U.S. Ambassador to Liberia Linda Thomas Greenfield. Griff Davis' 1948 photo of legendary painter Hale Woodruff is among Spike Lee's collection of historical photos in his current exhibition at the Brooklyn Museum entitled "Spike Lee: Creative Sources". Spike Lee is a Morehouse College Alumnus and recipient of the same Bennie Trailblazer Award from Morehouse College years after Griff Davis received his in February 1993.
